General Information

HEADQUARTERS: The Conference will be co-hosted by Arizona State University in Tempe and the American Graduate School of International Management in Glendale, suburbs of Phoenix, Arizona. Sessions will be held in the Memorial Union at ASU. The Business Meeting and the Banquet, with the Address by Dr. Hans Schauer, will be held at AGSIM.

ACCOMODATIONS: A motel reservation form is included in this program. Howard Johnson's is located at Apache Blvd. and College Ave., while the Holiday Inn is at 915 Apache Blvd. Both are adjacent to the ASU campus in Tempe.

TRANSPORTATION: Phoenix Sky Harbor Airport is served by major airlines and is approximately twenty minutes driving time from the ASU campus. Taxis and courtesy limousine service are available. For courtesy limousine service to the Holiday Inn of Tempe, call 968-3451; to Howard Johnson's of Tempe, call 967-9431 upon arrival.

SPECIAL FEATURES: Two free cocktail parties and a prime rib banquet are available. Members who pre-register for themselves and their spouses will be able to pick up tickets upon arrival at the Greenlee Room Registration Desk on the second floor of the Memorial Union. The Business Meeting of the Association will be held at the American Graduate School of International Management in Glendale on Friday, October 21. A cocktail party and the banquet will follow. Courtesy transportation from Tempe to AGSIM will depart the Memorial Union at 4:30 PM, stopping en route at the Holiday Inn and Howard Johnson's. Dr. Hans Schauer, Minister at the Embassy of the Federal Republic of Germany in Washington, will deliver the formal address at the banquet.

The second free cocktail party will be on Saturday evening at the Clubhouse of The Lakes in south Tempe. Courtesy transportation to the Clubhouse will depart the Memorial Union at 5:00 PM, returning about 7:00 PM.

Members who do not pre-register will be able to pick up tickets for these special features upon registration in the Greenlee Rcom when they arrive but only as long as space is available. Non-members who register for the conference will also be issued tickets as long as space is available.

We must notify the chefs some time in advance of the approximate number of persons to attend the banquet so that they may prepare properly. Only a limited number of seats can be held by the Association. Thus, pre-registration is strongly advised to help us plan for the banquet and for the courtesy transportation. You can help us by pre-registering.

PRE-REGISTRATION: Members of the Association who pre-register and enclose the \$6 fee will be able to pick up tickets at the Registration Desk in the Greenlee Room of the Memorial Union admitting them to the two free cocktail parties on Friday and Saturday night and to the prime rib banquet on Friday night. Admission to the cocktail parties and banquet is included in members' pre-registration fees. Members may order additional tickets to the cocktail parties and banquet at \$6 for the package. The Association urges pre-registration so that we can plan the number of persons at the banquet.

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
