UNIVERSITY OF WASHINGTON, SEATTLE

The University of Washington is located in a residential section of the port city of Seattle. The campus of 680 acres and more than one hundred permanent buildings lies between Lake Washington and Lake Union. It is the largest single-campus institution of higher education in the West, recognized for the excellence of its academic programs, faculty, research contributions, and public services. The city's metropolitan area, with a population of well over a million, affords many cultural, educational, and recreational advantages to the University community. Because of the salt water expanse of Puget Sound and the mountains both to the east and to the west, Seattle enjoys a moderate climate. Today, two thousand full-time faculty serve a student population of approximately thirty-four thousand. Students come to the University from all parts of the United States and from many foreign countries. This year about 17 percent of them are freshmen, 59 percent are advanced undergraduates, 4 percent are in the schools of law, medicine, and dentistry and 20 percent are students in the Graduate School.

The library system has some two million volumes and annual subscriptions to more than twenty-five thousand periodicals located in the Suzzalo Research Library and branch libraries on campus. The University also has a language laboratory with individual booths that are equipped with tape recorders, earphones, and programmed texts for practice in speaking and hearing foreign languages. Three University theatres, an educational television station, and an FM radio station operate throughout the year. The Thomas Burke Memorial Washington State Museum and the Henry Art Gallery are valuable educational and cultural resource centers.
