

GENERAL INFORMATION

LOCATION

The 1997 Twenty-First Annual Conference of the German Studies Association will meet in Washington, DC. The Conference Headquarters Hotel is the Hyatt Regency in Bethesda, Maryland, a Washington suburb. Additional overnight rooms are available at the Holiday Inn, Bethesda. The Hyatt Regency Bethesda is located at One Bethesda Metro Center, at Wisconsin Avenue and Old Georgetown Road, Bethesda, Maryland 20814. The telephone number is (301) 657-1234, and the fax is (301) 657-6453. The Conference Hotel rate is \$94, single or double. Europeans are advised that American hotel rates do not include breakfast. **It is important to note that the Hotel Check-In Time is 3 PM.** If you plan to arrive later than 3 PM, it is necessary to guarantee your room with a credit card to ensure that it will be kept for you. This is important!

This year, the German Studies Association is using a **special hotel reservation system**. You cannot book rooms into the GSA block of hotel rooms by contacting the hotel. Rooms may **only** be reserved through the German Studies Association Main Office. If you wish to be in the headquarters hotel, the Hyatt Regency, it is advised to book early. GSA reserves the right to place in either hotel. Both the Conference Registration form **and** the hotel reservation form should be sent to the GSA Main Office. The hotel reservation form will not be valid without paid conference registration. Therefore, it is necessary to pre-pay your conference registration either by U.S. check in U.S. dollars or by credit card, through filling out the Conference Registration Form. GSA will send the hotel reservation forms to the hotel, which will then mail reservation confirmations. You may fax your Conference Registration Form and Hotel Reservation Form to the GSA Main Office at (602) 965-8989. Be certain to include your credit card number for Registration and Reservation purposes, the type of credit card (only Visa and Master Card are accepted by GSA), the expiration date, and the exact name on the card. It is also necessary to sign the form. The Hotel Reservation Form is not valid without a paid Conference Registration, since only conference participants may receive the special hotel rate, and conference participants are those who have registered.

Persons attempting to book rooms directly with the hotel will pay another rate, not the special discounted GSA rate, and these rooms will not be part of the GSA block. The regular rate for the rooms we have booked is \$169 for single rooms and \$194 for double rooms. It is essential to book with GSA for the low discounted rate of \$94.

IMPORTANT: The special rate is available for Conference Registrants ONLY. If you do not register for the Conference, you are subject to the regular hotel rate above. In order to guarantee the Conference Rate for the hotel, YOU MUST REGISTER FOR THE CONFERENCE.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR ALL INTERNATIONAL PARTICIPANTS!

The United States is **not** a member of the European Banking Consortium. Eurocheques are **not** accepted by American banks or by hotels, restaurants, shops, etc. Some banks will make an exception, sometimes for a fee. Rates vary. If you must convert a Eurocheque, write it out in Deutsche Marks, not U.S. Dollars. The European banks do not recognize Eurocheques in dollars! Thus, an American bank may accept a Eurocheque for conversion at the dollar-mark rate with or without a fee or may decline to accept it at all. If it is written in dollars, expect a fee of up to 40%. Experienced European travelers bring traveler's checks (available in any European bank). Either dollar or DM traveler's checks are generally accepted by banks. Traveler's checks in dollars are accepted by hotels, restaurants, and shops. Credit cards are another good way to pay. They are widely used in the United States. The most popular are MasterCard, Visa, and Eurocard (which is MasterCard). Less popular are Diner's Club and American Express.

REGISTRATION INFORMATION

Pre-registration by Mail

Pre-registration at the reduced rate is available for members of the Association whose membership was in good standing as of July 1, 1997. **Persons who join the Association after that date pay the non-member rate.** A registration form is enclosed with this program and should be used to facilitate registration by mailing it before the deadline. Pre-registrants may pick up their registration packet at the GSA Registration Desk. Pre-registration for members as of July 1, 1997 is \$45. Regular registration, after pre-registration has closed, is available for members as of July 1 at the rate of \$50. Registration for non-members and those who joined the Association after July 1, 1997 is \$60. Pre-registration for the conference is available with the form in this program until September 10, 1997. Anyone may register at the Conference at the GSA Registration Desk. The special hotel rate is provided only to those persons who pay the Conference Registration Fee before check-out.

Luncheons are scheduled for Friday and Saturday, and the Banquet of the Association will be held on Friday evening. Attendance at the meal functions is by pre-registration only, and tickets should be ordered and paid for by check. After **September 23**, the availability of tickets for meal functions cannot be guaranteed. Meal tickets will be available in the registration packet which you receive at the Registration Desk. Kindly do not forget the meal ticket. Admission to the meals will not be permitted without a ticket. The hotel closes its meal count twenty-four hours in advance.

Wear your Registration Badge during the Conference. Only persons wearing an official GSA Registration Badge will be permitted in the Conference Area. Persons not wearing a badge will be denied entry. GSA representatives will assist those who have no badge by guiding them to the Registration Desk. No presenters may present a paper without wearing a Registration Badge.

Participants from Germany, Austria, and Switzerland: It is often the case in your country that persons are *invited* to a conference in order to present a paper. In such circumstances, that individual is not expected to pay registration fees. That is not the case for American scholarly associations. Here, no one is *invited*, and all are treated equally as having proposed papers/sessions. Thus, all are required to pay registration fees. American associations are “shared gatherings,” and costs are covered by sharing expenses, such as paying registration fees. This includes foreign participants who also present papers. You are not exempt, and are expected to participate in the costs as well as the benefits. All participants must pay registration fees.
