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## GENERAL INFORMATION

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### LOCATION

The 1998 Twenty-Second Annual Conference of the German Studies Association will meet in Salt Lake City, Utah, from October 8 through 11. The Conference Headquarters Hotel is the Little America Hotel and Towers, 500 South Main Street, Salt Lake City, Utah 84101. Tel: (800) 453-9450. The supplementary hotel is the Salt Lake Hilton, located at 150 West 500 South, Salt Lake City, Utah 84101. Tel: (801) 532-3344 . The two hotels are one block from one another. All hotel reservations must be made through the GSA Main Office, and the hotels will not accept reservations under the GSA block except those made through the GSA Main Office. Discounted GSA room rates for both hotels are \$98 a night, plus tax. Reservation requests may suggest one of the hotels, but GSA reserves the right to place registrants in either hotel. Hotel rooms at the GSA rate are only available for persons attending or participating in the Conference. Room rates outside of the GSA block are \$169 per night single at the Little America Hotel and Towers. Hotel reservation requests will only be accepted when accompanied by a Conference Registration Form.

GSA will send completed hotel reservation forms to the hotels and the hotels will mail out confirmations. If you have not received a confirmation, do not call GSA, because you will need to contact the hotel for confirmation in any case. Call the Little America Hotel and Towers. If you are not listed there, you will be listed in the Hilton and can call them to send you a confirmation. GSA has requested that confirmation forms for addresses outside of North America be sent by air mail.

Observe the cut-off date for our room block. If we do not receive your hotel reservation (and the conference registration) by the deadline, there is a possibility that there will be no room for you. It is also possible that our block will be exhausted if reservations are received shortly before the dead line. In the case of our block being exhausted before the deadline, we will make every effort to secure an alternative hotel. In the case of missing the deadline, we shall make every effort as well, and you should check with the Little America upon arrival if you have not received a confirmation before departure. As with our last Conference, where everyone who arrived was able to have a room in a nearby hotel, we anticipate no problem this year, either. Late reservations, or reservations "postmarked" by the deadline, are late. GSA will try, but can make no guarantees.

**REMEMBER!** It is necessary to register for the Conference to attend sessions and

it is necessary to register in order to receive a hotel room. If you are doubling in a room with someone, both parties must register for the Conference, and if the forms are sent individually, they should indicate with whom the individual is sharing the room.

Sessions are scheduled in **both** hotels, and participants are advised to consult the map in this Program to ascertain the location of meeting rooms in each hotel. The Program identifies rooms by hotel. The Hilton will operate a shuttle service from hotel to hotel during part of the Conference, in order to facilitate attendance at the meetings.

## **SPECIAL DOMESTIC AIRLINE FARES WITH DELTA AIRLINES**

The official domestic airline for the 1998 GSA Conference is **Delta Airlines**. GSA has received very good rates from Delta Airlines for our Conference in Salt Lake City, which is a Delta hub. There are no discounts on Delta Express, and these discounts do not apply to all fare categories. The Delta Meeting Desk can explain which categories apply to our discounts. ## **IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR ALL INTERNATIONAL PARTICIPANTS!**

The United States is **not** a member of the European Banking Consortium. Eurocheques are **not** accepted by American banks or by hotels, restaurants, shops, etc. Some banks will make an exception, sometimes for a fee. Rates vary. If you must convert a Eurocheque, write it out in Deutsche Marks, not U.S. Dollars. The European banks do not recognize Eurocheques in dollars! Thus, an American bank may accept a Eurocheque for conversion at the dollar-mark rate with or without a fee or may decline to accept it at all. If it is written in dollars, expect a fee of up to 40%. Experienced European travelers bring traveler's checks (available in any European bank). Either dollar or DM traveler's checks are generally accepted by banks. Traveler's checks in dollars are accepted by hotels, restaurants, and shops. Credit cards are another good way to pay. They are widely used in the United States. The most popular are MasterCard, Visa, and Eurocard (which is MasterCard). Less popular are Diner's Club and American Express.

## **REGISTRATION INFORMATION**

### **Pre-registration by Mail**

Pre-registration at the reduced rate is available for members of the Association whose membership was in good standing as of July 1, 1998. **Persons who join the Association after that date pay the non-member rate.** A registration form is enclosed with this program and should be used to facilitate registration by mailing it before the deadline. Pre-registrants may pick up their registration packet at the GSA Registration Desk. Pre-registration for members as of July 1, 1998 is \$45. Regular registration, after pre-registration has closed, is available for members as of July 1 at the rate of \$50. Registration for non-members and those who joined the Association after July 1, 1998 is \$60. Pre-registration for the conference is available with the form in this program until September 10, 1998. Anyone may register at the Conference at the GSA Registration Desk. The special hotel rate is provided only to those persons who pay the Conference Registration Fee before check-out.

**Participants from Germany, Austria, and Switzerland:** It is often the case in your country that persons are *invited* to a conference in order to present a paper. In such circumstances, that individual is not expected to pay registration fees. That is not the case for American scholarly associations. Here, no one is *invited*, and all are treated equally as having proposed papers/sessions. Thus, all are required to pay registration fees. American associations are “shared gatherings,” and costs are covered by sharing expenses, such as paying registration fees. This includes foreign participants who also present papers. You are not exempt, and are expected to participate in the costs as well as the benefits. All participants must pay registration fees.
